## Christmas Eve Focus for Worship - Silent Night, Holy Night

"Silent Night" was first written in German by Austrian Pastor Joseph Mohr, with music composed by Franz Gruber. The carol was first performed on Christmas Eve in 1818 at St. Nicholas Church in Oberndorf, Austria. Legend says the church organ was broken, prompting Gruber to compose a simple guitar accompaniment. Subsequently accompanied by many instruments and translated into many languages, the text paints the picture of the Incarnation. The last phrase is repeated, so in the second stanza we hear it twice: "Christ the Savior is born!" Every word of that phrase is significant, and every line of the Christmas carol describes a Bible truth. We use the beloved hymn to ponder the profound message of Christmas.


1 John 1:8-9

On this holy night, we remember why Jesus was born. He came because of sin and because of love. He came to take away the punishment and guilt of our sin, and to bring us the comfort and grace of God's eternal love. Tonight we ponder the mystery of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we make room for him in our hearts, confessing our sins to him and welcoming him as our blessed Savior.

Lord Jesus, we confess that we are by nature sinful and that we have sinned against you in our thoughts, words, and actions. We need you and the mercy which you were born to bring, and so we come before your manger this night and pray: "O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us we pray; cast out our sin and enter in; be born in us today."

Jesus Christ did not come into the world to condemn us, but to save us from the punishment and curse of our sin. He is the atoning sacrifice for all our sins. He was born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those under the law, that we might receive adoption to sonship. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son + and of the Holy Spirit.


Amen. Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Amen.




First Reading Micah 5:2-5

<sup>1</sup>In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. <sup>2</sup>(This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) <sup>3</sup>And everyone went to their own town to register.

## **Prayer of the Church**

Gracious Father, when the time had fully come, you sent your Son to carry out your plan to save the world from the tyranny of sin, the threat of death, and the power of Satan. On this holy night, strengthen our faith as we ponder the depth of your divine love.

Lead us to quiet awe as we remember your gracious compassion.

Forgive us and move us to trust in his mission to save us.

Take away our fears and fright and fill us with joy as we hear the message that Jesus was born for us and that he came to restore peace with you and mend the bond broken by sin. Move us to sing our carols and hymns not with passing pleasure but with the depth of praise for his extraordinary love.

Let our songs and hymns reflect our faith in the redemption gained by Christ.

Lead us to kneel at his manger with hearts of faith and to see there the God-man who takes away the sins of the world. Guide and guard us so that the happiness shared with family and friends does not delay or discourage our journey to his holy crib.

Make the birth of Christ our highest priority and deepest pleasure.

Fill us with an eager joy that moves us to share the good news with others, especially those who may have forgotten or dismissed the love of God in Christ. Give us faith-filled maturity to recognize that the best gift we can give to children is the story of Jesus who was born as a baby and died on a cross to save them for heaven.

Move us to tell the good news we have seen and heard.

During this hectic holiday, provide us with quiet times to remember what the birth of Jesus really means for us and all people, that he came to free us from the evil forces that separated us from your love, that he lived and died to forgive our sins, and that he rose in triumph to prepare a place where we will live with you forever.

Move us to sing with hearts of faith, "Glory to God in the highest!" Amen.

#### **Candle Lighting**


The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.







## Blessing
